







Literature is a thriving and integral part of the United Kingdom cultural sector and there is a longstanding tradition of well established creative writing courses and programmes at UK universities, allowing for multiple opportunities to learn about all aspects of writing. In an attempt to explore British creative writing methodologies and with the aim to raise awareness of the wide range of UK literary production, back in 2013, the British Council in Greece joined forces with Kingston Writing School and Kingston University and launched the first International Creative Writing School in Athens. The Summer School is held on an annual basis every June in Athens and since 2014 in Thessaloniki as well. Remaining faithful to its commitment for continuous improvement, this year the Summer School comprises a series of engaging and upto-date workshops, combining the practice of writing skills (Fiction, Flash Fiction, Poetry, Non-Fiction, Genre Fiction) with an exciting Publishing and Editing course and a Writing for the Web. Once again students are offered the opportunity to explore their potential and extend their knowledge in a vibrant atmosphere of mutual respect.

The International Creative Writing Summer School aims to create a space for meaningful dialogue and exchange of ideas between writers from across the world at what is a dynamic and everchanging time in Europe. The synergy of the British Council and Kingston Writing School will provide a unique learning experience with an international approach and outlook. The Summer School is designed to provide writers with an opportunity to work with leading writers/academics associated with the Kingston Writing School, enabling them to enhance their writing skills, no matter what the extent of their experience or aspiration is, and maximise the resonance and quality of their work. The Summer School also provides students with networking opportunities, thus increasing mutual understanding, building connections between UK writers and their counterparts in Greece, Europe and around the world and creating an international community of writers.

In Athens, we once again offer three of our most popular courses - Flash Fiction, Fiction, and Poetry. The first two will be taught by first time teachers Paul McVeigh and John Man, both highly esteemed writers in their respective fields, and the third by award-winning poet Siobhan Campbell, who returns by popular demand after an absence of five years. We again have Judith Watts, former managing director of Kingston University Press, back to teach Publishing and Editing, her course having previously proved such an enormous hit in Thessaloniki initially and in Athens last year; and award-winning blogger Sinead Keegan, co-founder of the increasingly influential online publication all the sins (italics), who has updated her course Writing for the Web.

In response to requests from past students and applicants, we have also added a course on Genre Fiction taught by the multi-talented science fiction and children's literature writer N.M. (Nicky) Browne. And, last but in no way least, the acclaimed author and teacher Heidi James will shift her highly popular course in Flash Fiction from Athens to Thessaloniki.

As always, the writers leading all of the courses will bring a huge wealth of knowledge and insight into the classroom. They will ensure that the atmosphere in the courses will be - as they have always been - stimulating, inspiring, respectful, sociable and fun. With their guidance and support you will be able not only to develop your writing, whatever your current experience, but also to gain valuable transferrable skills that will help you in many areas of your life and work.

Course programme

Courses are designed for an international audience and will provide participants with the skills and expertise needed by writers today.

This year, the Summer School offers students the opportunity to hone their writing skills, practise writing fiction, flash fiction, non fiction and poetry, and extend their knowledge of publishing, editing and writing for the web under the supervision and guidance of highly accomplished writers and academics.

Experienced writers associated with the Kingston Writing School and Kingston University, London will work in small groups with writers from across the world on an intensive programme which involves workshops, a range of writing activities, group discussions, readings and one-to-one tutorials. Learning will be challenging, enjoyable and engaging.

Students may choose from six one-week courses in Athens and a one-week course in Thessaloniki. Courses will be held in English, are suitable for writers at all levels and may be taken separately or in combination.

Who is it for?

- Greek and international writers of all levels (from emerging to accomplished)
- English language teachers, academics, journalists, columnists, copy editors, publishing and creative professionals who want to enhance their writing skills
- Anyone with a passion for good writing

The International Creative Writing School will:

- give writers the opportunity to explore their imaginative and expressive potential, to develop their own voice and to raise their awareness of the technical and compositional issues associated with writing
- improve students' critical abilities and writing skills through constructive engagement with the work of their peers and build up their confidence in writing
- create new and strengthen existing relationships and ties with professionals in the field of literature from the UK, Greece and beyond
- provide a vibrant network for professional development and mutual support
- increase the sense of belonging to an international community of writers

Flash Fiction with Paul McVeigh

4-8 June 2018

- Designed for aspiring and accomplished writers alike who want to enhance their skills for writing flash fiction and short fiction
- Participants will explore and discuss flash fiction and micro literature from a variety of authors and consider from where they gain their inspiration and will have the chance to experiment with voice and style.
- · Workshops will centre on exercises, constructive feedback, experimentation and discussion in a supportive and friendly atmosphere



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Paul McVeigh's short fiction has appeared in journals, anthologies and on BBC Radio 3, 4 & 5. His debut novel, *The Good Son*, has won 2 awards in the UK and

his writing has been translated into 7 languages. He is the co-founder of London Short Story Festival, associate director at Word Factory the UK's national organisation for excellence in the short story and he judges international short story competitions. Paul has represented the short story form for the British Council in Mexico and Turkey and is currently shortlisted for the Irish Short Story of the Year. He has read his work and taught flash fiction at the UK's Flash Fiction Day celebrations and at the UK's first Flash Fiction Festival in 2016.

Non-Fiction with John Man

4-8 June 2018

- Suitable for aspiring and experienced non-fiction writers and journalists
- The students will examine strategies related to five key stages in the development of their writing, such as content (choosing your subject), sources (gathering the raw material, structure (turning facts into narrative), style (academic versus populist) and marketing (agents, contracts and public relations)



John Man writes on Inner Asia, in particular Mongolia and north China. After studying languages at Oxford, John did post-graduate courses in the History and

Philosophy of Science (Oxford) and Mongolian (SOAS, London). Training as a journalist with Reuters, he joined Time-Life Books, becoming European Editor. In the 1970s he began writing non-fiction. From the 1990s, when the Soviet Union collapsed, John has focused on Mongolia. He has travelled extensively, exploring the Gobi desert (*Gobi: Tracking the Desert*, 1997), the valley where Genghis Khan died in north-west China, the mountain on which he may be buried, and Xanadu, Kublai Khan's first capital. *Genghis Khan: Life, Death and Resurrection* is a best-seller in 22 languages. The 14 books in print include *Attila the Hun, Kublai Khan, The Terracotta Army, The Great Wall, Xanadu* (published in the US as Marco Polo, to accompany the Netflix TV series) and *The Mongol Empire. Saladin* appeared in April 2015, and his latest, *Amazons,* in June 2017. In 2007, John was awarded Mongolia's Friendship Medal for services to Anglo-Mongolian relations.

Fiction with Suzy Joinson

11-15 June 2018

- Designed for writers seeking to enhance their fiction writing skills, in particular novels and short stories
- An accessible approach to creating a manageable shape from first drafts and first ideas, helping writers to take their work to the next level
- Explores technical approaches including: character, sense of time and place, narrative development, plotting and voice



Suzy Joinson is an award winning writer with two novels published by Bloomsbury (*The Photographer's Wife* and *A Lady Cyclist's Guide to Kashgar*) as well as

numerous pieces published in a range of places including the New York Times, Guardian, and the Independent. She won the Creative Non-Fiction New Writing Ventures Award and has been long-listed for the IMPAC award.

Poetry with Siobhan Campbell

11-15 June 2018

- Designed for aspiring and continuing writers who want to develop and enhance their poetry writing skills
- Students will participate in poem-building and inspiring exercises to write from the natural world, from lived experience and speculatively
- They will be encouraged to bring their poems to life via form, music and meaning, and during the week of workshops we will read striking examples of contemporary work



Siobhan Campbell is a leading contemporary poet and the author of five collections, most recently *Heat Signature* from Seren Press. Siobhan has been

awarded prizes in the National and Troubadour International competitions and she won the Oxford Brookes International Poetry Prize in 2016. Siobhan's work is included in canonical anthologies including *Identity Parade: New British and Irish Poetry* (Bloodaxe) and *Womens' Work: Twentieth Century Writing in English* (Seren). Known as an inspiring teacher and reader, Siobhan's wryly humourous work has been termed 'fierce and luminous - torpedoes lined with feather strokes' by Bernard O'Donoghue, Oxford poet and critic.



Writing For The Web with Sinead Keegan

18-22 June 2018

- Designed for aspiring and accomplished writers looking to become more familiar with and confident using the internet for their writing
- Focuses on the opportunities offered by the internet for writers of all types, looks at examples of successful internet writing and considers the pros and cons of different platforms
- Examines the process of publishing online with specific reference to digital arts publications and the opportunities available to both emerging and

established writers



Sinead Keegan is a writer, blogger, lecturer and editor. Her blog, Finding Home, has been short and longlisted annually for Blog Awards Ireland 'Best Arts and Culture

Blog' and 'Best of the Diaspora' for five years running. She is co-editor and founder of *All the sins*, a quarterly digital arts publication that embraces the ability of the internet to increase artistic discourse and to push art past accepted boundaries. She is the founder and coordinator of the Stories of SW1 annual writing competition. She has an MFA in creative writing and lectures in creative and critical writing at Kingston University and London Metropolitan University. She regularly writes web and print content for various corporations and non-profit organisations. Her poetry and short stories have been published in print and online in publications including *Magma* and *The Lake*.

Genre Fiction (SciFi/Children's and Young Adults Literature) with N.M. Browne

18-22 June 2018

- Designed for aspiring and accomplished writers alike who want to develop and enhance their writing skills
- Explores the key elements involved in effective storytelling, in particular the techniques used in writing genre fiction: SF/Fantasy, historical, crime, children's and YA writing etc
- It will combine practical exercises with analytical feedback all based around the workshop plus individual tutorials to help participants work on

developing their own writing practice



Nicky Browne is an experienced creative writing teacher with a PhD in Creative Writing. She has published nine Young Adult novels, eight books for

young children with Bloomsbury and is working on an historical novel for adults. She has been twice nominated for the prestigious Carnegie Medal for children's literature.



Publishing / Editing with Judith Watts

25-29 June 2018

- Presents tools and processes for editing work, sending out submissions, writing a synopsis, approaching agents and getting paid
- Explores the current publishing landscape across genres to help participants assess how to best share their writing
- Discussions will focus on issues such as types of publishers, the benefits of digital editions, the use of social media platforms and the global market place



Judith Watts is a practitioner in the business of reading and writing. Running alongside a varied career in publishing she taught Publishing at Master's level for ten

years at Kingston University (where she received her MFA in Creative Writing). Judith is a published poet, and author in the best-selling Hodder Teach Yourself Writing series. She is currently Visiting Lecturer at City University and University College, focusing on authors, content and professional development. She works with publishers editorial and marketing projects, and with writers to bring their work to market.

Thessaloniki

Flash Fiction with Heidi James

18-22 June 2018

- Suitable for all writers who want to experiment with extraordinary storytelling
- Draws on exercises, workshops and individual feedback to develop confidence, skill and knowledge
- Explores the range and potential of the micro or flash fiction genre as a stand-alone genre and as a route to closely examining the 'foundation' of the story for longer works



Heidi James's novel *So the Doves* is The Sunday Times Crime Novel of the Month. *Wounding* was also published by Bluemoose Books in April, 2014. Heidi

was a finalist for the Cinnamon Poetry Collection Prize. Her novella The *Mesmerist's Daughter* (published by Neon Press in April 2015) won the Saboteur Award. Her novel *Carbon*, was published by Blatt and is published in Spanish by El Tercer Nombre.
